






Year 3




















Dear Diary,

Have you ever thought about how water comes in your tap clean, fresh, instantly and ready to drink? Where does this water come from? Well on 19th February 2024, year 5 visited Bough Beech Reservoir for our school trip and all theses questions were answers and many more were answers

It was the first day back after half-term and it comes with a school trip. Mrs King, my schoolteacher, strictly told us to bring our cost and wellington boots. However, I had lost my coat in school! Unwillingly, I put on my non-uniform coat on, my wellington boots and my smile. I hoped not to get told by Mrs King off at school and that my teacher will not notice.

In the rush of getting on to the minibus, I made a quick attempt to find my coat. Just as I was about to look, we were each given a wristband by Mrs King, and we all sat in the Minibus. I was sitting next to my best friend, Iva, and we were both excited.

After the scenic journey, which was 50 minutes long we had arrived! Our tour guide, Lisa, showed us straight to the education room and there we learnt all about the treatment to get clean water. What surprised me the most is that it took seven steps just to get clean water. In addition, she wasn't only going to tell us all about these steps, she was going to show the humongous machinery used to produce clean water.

Firstly, Lisa showed us the reservoir were they collected water to clean. Then we got to see a beautiful bridge, and there was what looked like a humongous blender. This was filled with an endless amount of water that overflowed in the reservoir and this water would go to River Eden.

The first two steps of this process are screening and aeration. The third step coagulation was one of my favourites. It looked like a car park but with no cars and water! This step is supposed to clean water. Next came Sedimentation. Liss told us that this process separates the small particles (sediment in water). This process looked like a fidget spinner but only with one wing and it was in a round circular shape like a pound

At this point, we all had lunch in the education room. Did you know we are drinking the same water as

After that, she showed us the machinery used for filtration: this one looked cool. This is here so that the clear water passes through the clay sand or charcoal. I thought it looked very satisfying when the water became clear at once. This one could be in two different forms. One was again like a car park. However, the other type of form had circular blades that consistently twisted round like a helicopter. Chlorination was the second last step! The purpose of this was that it could kill all viruses and bacteria.

Lastly, was supply treatment. We could not actually see this happen in front of our eyes because the water went to a special factory where there was UV light. Although the day wasn't over

To finish the day, we went in the Blue Room. This was probably my favourite. In this room we were split into four groups and there were four activities. The first one was a quiz about how many litres you use for everyday activities. The second one, you had to predict how many times you could do different stuff and how many times it would take to fill a cubic metre. Then came my favourite activity, this one was like a puzzle. You had to connect different pipes with magnets on the end to to the houses in two minutes so that each house could get water. The last one showed you how many litres of water on average you should use for everyday activities which included water. Then we had to carry a litre of water because in some areas of Africa people don't have water near them. Therefore, they have to travel long distances to get water and most of the time this water wasn't clean. They had to carry a kg of water like we did, and we all felt sympathy and thought how hard it must be for them.

Today was an unforgettable day. I have learnt some very interesting things. The two most important thing I have learnt from this school trip is NEVER forget your coat. But mostly never ever waste water or food. We can't survive without water. It is vital to us, and we need to treat it carefully.

ISA Regional Cross Country 2024

On Tuesday afternoon 10 girls from Years 2-6 went to Radnor House to compete in the regional qualifiers of the national cross-country championships with the top 10 girls from each race qualifying for the national finals on Saturday 2nd March. First up was the U9 team of Evie, Posy, Zeynab, Alyssa, and Olivia, they performed brilliantly with Evie running a superb race coming in 10th place therefore earning herself a trip to the finals, the fact that she is 2 years younger as well makes this result even more staggering, Posy, also 2 years younger, was next to cross the line in an amazing 16th position, she was quickly followed by Zeynab in 26th, Alyssa in 32nd and Olivia in 33rd, this earned the girls 3rd place overall in the team event. Then it was the turn of the U11 team of Sienna, Lyla, Izzy, Aliyah, and Ava over the longer race to see if any of them could join Evie. They all ran fantastically well with Sienna improving on last year's silver by superbly winning gold and earning a third trip for herself to the finals in as many years and this time she would have her younger sister for company. Next across the line was Lyla in 19th, followed by Izzy in 48th, Aliyah in 63rd, and Iva in 68th. With Lyla and Iva both being a year younger they will still get the chance to compete for places in the finals next year. Parent Webinar-Atom


