## Year 6 Trip

On Monday 11th March, Year 6 went on a fun trip to Temper Temper Chocolate workshop. We enjoyed this trip a lot and found out a lot of interesting facts about chocolate such as, if a cocoa pod is picked early and made into chocolate, it turns into a ruby kind of colour. When we arrived, we started by preparing like we normally do in a Food Tech lesson: rolling up our sleeves, putting on an apron and then washing our hands. After that, we began to make our own chocolate figures and chose a base type of chocolate. The options were dark, white and milk chocolate, once we'd chosen that, we used the other 2 types of chocolate to add detail in a mould. Then, after the detail had dried, we put in our base chocolate and made sure that it was everywhere. We counted 5 seconds (in many different languages) to cool down each side until eventually the figures and moulds on top were put in the fridge to set together. It looked so delicious and awesome once it had set. Then we started making chocolate lollies with sweets on them. Once again, we had to choose our base chocolate before we added details. Most of the time, we were piping chocolate and learning how to take it out once it had hardened in the piping bag. Just before lunch, we started making Chocolate Florentine with loads of different patterns and 3 of each base chocolate. 3 Florentine with the base as white chocolate, 3 Florentine with the base chocolate as dark chocolate and 3 Florentine with the base of milk chocolate. We may have gotten messy, but we definitely enjoyed that. Then we had our lunch and sat down to taste chocolate and cocoa nibs while learning some history of chocolate. In my opinion, the cocoa nibs tasted horrible and all of us went to get a tissue to get the nibs out of our mouths, they were crunchy and bland but something else as well. Then
we tasted some chocolates with less sugar and some with more. Milk was my favourite and tasted the best, but the ruby chocolate tasted like berry flavour and wasn't that bad. After enjoying our time, we had to say goodbye and I'm sure we will go there again with our families.
